

# PUBLIC SAFETY

## Annual Security and Fire Safety Report, 2010-11

---

Lafayette is an independent, coeducational, undergraduate college in the College Hill section of Easton, Pa., a small city of about 30,000 people. The College enrolls 2,344 full-time equivalent students (53 percent men, 47 percent women) in the day and evening programs, about 2,069 of who live on campus in residence halls or fraternity and sorority houses. About 252 students, mostly upper-level students, reside off campus in College-owned housing or private housing. The College employs 206 full-time faculty and 498 full-time administrators and support staff. The College also employs 160 part-time faculty, administrators, and support staff.

### Office of Public Safety

Located on the ground floor of Marquis Hall, the Office of Public Safety is responsible for around-the-clock protection of the Lafayette campus. The staff consists of a Director of Public Safety (who reports to the Vice President for Finance and Administration and Treasurer), 2 assistant directors, 1 manager, 2 supervisors, 9 full-time officers, 16 part-time officers, 2 full-time dispatchers, 5 part-time dispatchers, and 2 full-time office staff.

The Director of Public Safety, 1 assistant director, 2 supervisors, and 13 other public safety personnel are commissioned police officers with powers of arrest who have Pennsylvania Act 235 training. The public safety office also requires Pennsylvania Act 120 training for all newly hired police officers.

In addition to the 17 commissioned police officers, the public safety office has three security officers who have had law enforcement training and experience. Also, nine security officers have received security officer training.

Each year, all Lafayette police officers attend the annual Pennsylvania in-service training at the Allentown Police Academy that is required for municipal police officers in the state. In-house training is provided on an on-going basis for all personnel of the public safety office. All personnel are subject to criminal background checks before they are employed and periodically during their employment.

All Lafayette police officers and security officers are trained to handle security and safety matters on campus, as well as to perform first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. They are trained and equipped with portable oxygen and an automated external defibrillator (AED). They are recertified as required.

Lafayette's certified police officers carry batons, handcuffs, and firearms. Certified security officers carry batons. All carry flashlights and two-way radios.

The public safety office works closely with the City of Easton Police Department (25 South 3rd St., Easton), Forks Township Police Department (1604 Sullivan Trail, Easton), City of Easton Fire Department, and City of Easton Bureau of Codes and Inspections. The public safety office reports crimes and other incidents to these agencies as per ongoing collaborative practices. Likewise, the Easton and Forks Township police departments report to the public safety office any incidents involving Lafayette College students in their jurisdictions. If appropriate, public safety staff will notify state and/or federal agencies and work with them on investigations. If the public safety office is notified of a violent crime perpetrated against a student, public safety notifies other College offices, including the Office of the Dean of Students, the Counseling Center, and Health Services.

The Easton Police Department provides "Sex Offender Registration Information" to the public safety office as appropriate. This information is available at the public safety office and from the Easton Police. The Pennsylvania State Police maintains a Megan's Law web site for Pennsylvania at <http://www.pameganslaw.state.pa.us/>.

The public safety office uses patrol vehicles to patrol campus, visit outlying campus areas, and in case of emergencies. Emergency health care is provided at the College's Bailey Health Center from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekends during the academic year. This care is supplemented by the services of the College's Counseling Center and Easton Hospital. Emergency transportation for injured students or employees is available by contacting the public safety office via the emergency telephone number, (610) 330-4444, or extension 4444 on campus.

The Public Safety Office is responsible for the campus parking program, including registering staff and student vehicles and enforcing parking and traffic regulations.

The College's residence hall staff, including resident advisers, completes a yearly training program.

### Reporting Crimes

To report an emergency or a crime, students, faculty, and staff should call, write, or walk into the public safety office in Room 11 on the ground floor of Marquis Hall. All members of the campus community are encouraged to report ALL CRIMES to the public safety office in a timely fashion.

Emergency/convenience telephones are installed on the exterior of all campus residence halls. These phones are also used by visitors to contact the occupants of residence halls, which are locked 24 hours a day. In addition, freestanding emergency telephones are installed in various locations on campus. Each of the convenience and emergency phones has an emergency button that automatically connects the caller to the dispatching center in the public safety office and automatically identifies the location of the phone to the dispatcher.

Telephones also are available in all academic, administrative, and recreational buildings. A dispatcher is on duty to receive calls to the public safety office at all times.

Campus “pastoral and professional” counselors advise those whom they are counseling about the option to report the incident or crime they are discussing to the public safety office and procedure for doing so.

All crimes that are reported to the public safety office also are reported to the Easton Police Department. If, in the judgment of the Director of Public Safety, Assistant Director of Public Safety, or Public Safety Supervisors, a serious crime reported to the public safety office constitutes an ongoing threat to the campus community, the public safety office notifies the campus community by email about the crime that has been reported. Those who do not have email are notified by a paper copy of the announcement.

### **Alcohol, Drugs, and Weapons**

Lafayette College complies with federal, state, and local laws regulating the possession, use, or sale of alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, and weapons. The unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol on institutional property or at any officially sanctioned College activity by any member of the College community is strictly prohibited. Students and employees who violate this regulation are subject to severe disciplinary action by the College and may incur penalties prescribed by civil authorities.

For students, sanctions imposed by the College for violations of the above regulations may range from probation to expulsion from the College and referral to College police, local, state, or federal authorities. Sanctions for employees may vary from mandatory participation in rehabilitation programs to termination of employment and referral to authorities for prosecution.

Lafayette policies with respect to alcohol and illegal drugs are spelled out in the Student Handbook (available on the Division of Student Life website at [studentlife.lafayette.edu](http://studentlife.lafayette.edu)) and in other materials published by the Division of Student Life.

Alcohol-abuse education and drug-abuse education programs are provided by the College through the Counseling Center as part of the College Health Services.

### **Crime Prevention and Safety**

The public safety office publishes crime-prevention tips and other information on safety and security procedures and makes these materials available to students, faculty, administrators, and staff. Each year, incoming students are given this information at New-Student Orientation. The public safety office conducts crime-prevention programs each semester, and specially trained crime-prevention officers are available to make presentations on

campus at other times. The public safety office conducts a self-defense program twice during each academic year that is open to all members of the campus community at no charge.

The public safety office’s Project ID makes engraving tools available to students for marking personal property. Project ID is publicized at New-Student Orientation, in the crime prevention newsletter, in pamphlets, and through various programs throughout the academic year.

This Security and Fire Safety Report is prepared annually and published at the beginning of the academic year. It includes yearly crime statistics that are reported to the Pennsylvania State Police and to federal authorities and are made available upon request. This complies with the guidelines set forth in the federal Jeanne Cleary Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. Each year the public safety office also distributes a summary of campus crime statistics that is compiled in accordance with a guidelines set forth in the Pennsylvania College and University Security Information Act.

The public safety office maintains a daily crime log that is available to the public. The student newspaper, *The Lafayette*, routinely publishes the daily crime log. Also the *Express-Times* newspaper has been publishing serious crimes reported on a routine basis.

### **Emergency Response**

The College’s Incident Action Plan (IAP) includes information about the Incident Action Group (IAG); College operating parameters; incident priorities and performance expectations; and shelter-in-place and evacuation guidelines.

The College has conducted fire-exit drills in residence halls and table-top exercises on other emergency scenarios. The College plans to conduct field exercises and tests of the emergency notification systems on campus. These tests are designed to assess and evaluate the College’s emergency plans and capabilities. The public safety office’s police officers and supervisors are trained in incident command and responding to critical incidents on campus.

When a serious incident occurs that causes an immediate threat to the campus, the first responders to the scene are usually the public safety office, Easton Police Department, and the City of Easton Fire/Rescue and Emergency Medical Services, and we work together to manage the incident. Depending on the nature of the incident, other City of Easton departments and other local or federal agencies may also be involved in responding.

### **Notification to the College Community about an Immediate Threat**

Each year, the public safety office reminds all members of the College community to notify the public safety office about any situation or incident on campus that may involve an immediate or on-going threat to the health and safety of members of the College community.

The public safety office has the responsibility of responding to, and summoning the necessary resources to mitigate, investigate, and document any situation that may cause a significant emergency or dangerous situation. The public safety office also has a responsibility to respond to such incidents to determine if the situation does in fact, pose a threat to the College community. If that is the case, federal law requires that

the institution immediately notify the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation.

If, in the judgment of the Director of Public Safety, the Assistant Director of Public Safety, or Public Safety Supervisors an emergency or dangerous situation on or off campus poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the College community, the public safety office activates the Lafayette e2Campus Emergency Alert System. Members of the College community who have enrolled in the emergency alert service receive a text message advising them about the nature of the emergency and appropriate steps to take. In addition, all members of the campus community with an email account receive the same message via email. At the same time, the College's outdoor mass alert siren/public address system is sounded, reminding members of the College community to check for text messages and email messages that will inform them of the nature of the emergency and appropriate steps to take.

Note: Public Safety, without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, will determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the judgment of the first responders (including, but not limited to, Public Safety, Easton Police Department, and the Easton Fire and Emergency Medical Services), compromise the efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The public safety office's patrol vehicles are equipped with public address systems and can strategically be placed throughout the campus to facilitate communication.

Members of the larger community who are interested in receiving information about emergencies on campus may sign up for the emergency text message system.

### **Missing Students Who Reside in On-Campus Housing**

A member of the College community who believes that a student who resides on-campus is missing should immediately notify the public safety office at (610) 330-4444. The public safety office will generate a missing-person report and initiate an investigation.

Should the public safety office determine that a student is missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours, the public safety office will notify (a) the Easton Police Department and (b) the emergency contact person that student has registered with the College no later than 24 hours after determining that the student is missing. If a missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, the public safety office will notify the student's parent or legal guardian immediately upon determining that the student is missing.

The public safety office will enter the missing person's name in the National Crime Information Center database and notify the Easton Police Department and the student's emergency contact. This will take place within 24 hours of the initial report. Public safety also will notify the parents of students over the age of 18 in our attempt to locate the student who is missing.

In addition to registering a contact person to be notified in case of a general emergency situation, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to designate one or more persons whom they would like the College to notify in the specific emergency situation that they have been determined by

the public safety office to be missing for more than 24 hours. This allows students, if they wish to do so, to designate one or more contacts specifically for a missing-person emergency who is/are different from the one(s) they have listed as general emergency contacts. Students may do this through Banner Self-Service ([registrar.lafayette.edu/banner-self-service](http://registrar.lafayette.edu/banner-self-service)). The contact information they supply will be registered and maintained confidentially.

### **Sexual Harassment, Sexual Assault, or Rape**

The Office of Residence Life, the Counseling Center, the Department of Athletics, and the public safety office provide programs to promote awareness of rape and other sexual offenses. Additional programs are presented or arranged by the Office of Residence Life and academic departments.

Any form of sexual misconduct – including sexual harassment, sexual assault, and rape – is considered to be a violation of the College's Code of Conduct. Students who violate the Code of Conduct are subject to the following disciplinary sanctions: warning probation, disciplinary probation level I or disciplinary probation level II, suspension, or expulsion. Students are encouraged to recognize their responsibility for their actions and to understand that intoxication, ignorance of the rules of the College, or such similar attempts at evasion will serve as no excuse for violations.

The College strongly encourages persons who believe they have been victims of sexual harassment, sexual assault, or rape to bring this to the attention of College authorities by calling the public safety office at (610) 330-4444 (if the incident has just occurred) or at (610) 330-5330 (if the incident has happened in the recent past).

A student may also contact the College's Sexual Assault Counseling and Education (SACE) Coordinators, who are responsible for coordinating assistance and support for persons who report having been sexually assaulted, including matters related to the person's physical and mental health, personal safety, and academic status. The SACE coordinators are Patty Martino and Rosanne Poliskiewicz at the Bailey Health Center, phone (610) 330-5964.

In the case of sexual harassment, students may consult with one of the College's confidential sexual harassment consultants who will provide support and assistance in understanding College policies and procedures regarding sexual harassment.

Once a student calls the public safety office, a public safety officer will obtain the basic facts. The student will be advised that the SACE Coordinator can be called to offer support and assistance. The Easton Police Department and the Northampton County District Attorney's Office will be notified. The officer will ask for a formal interview with the student to determine what happened. If the student wishes, the SACE Coordinator or other support personnel may be present during the interview. The officer will gather information about the perpetrator, where the incident took place, witnesses, and what happened before and after the harassment or assault.

The officer will outline the options for action that the student may take. The public safety office and the Easton Police Department will jointly coordinate the investigation.

**IMPORTANT:** Reporting an incident is a separate step from choosing to prosecute through on-campus or off-campus authorities. When a student makes a statement to a public safety officer, he or she is not obligated to continue with legal action or College disciplinary action. A student who is at least 18 years of age may choose whether to participate in legal or disciplinary action at any point. In compliance with Pennsylvania state law, parents will be notified of all incidents where the victim is under age 18.

The SACE Coordinator can assist any student who wishes to file a formal complaint of sexual harassment or sexual assault against another student by submitting a written, signed statement detailing the incident(s) to a member of the Division of Student Life (101 Hogg Hall, 610-330-5082; 132 Farinon Center, 610-330-5335; 115 Farinon Center, 610-330-5337). The procedures for handling such charges, which go before the Student Conduct Committee, will be explained to the student by the counselor and personnel in the Division of Student Life. Complaints will be handled confidentially and as timely as possible. Students are encouraged to review the College's Policy on Sexual Assault and Policy on Sexual Harassment in the *Lafayette College Student Handbook*. They are also encouraged to review the Statement on the Rights and Responsibilities of Students of Lafayette College in the *Student Handbook*.

Complaints against staff members may be made to the Vice President for Human Resources and General Counsel (12 Markle Hall, 610-330-5060). Complaints against faculty members may be made to the Provost and Dean of the Faculty (219 Markle Hall, 610-330-5070). During campus disciplinary proceedings, the accuser and accused have the same rights to have others present during the hearing. Also, both the accuser and the accused are informed of the outcome of the hearing.

A student may wish to report an incident of sexual harassment or sexual assault directly to the Easton Police Department by calling 9-911 from a campus phone or 911 from other phones. However, the public safety office encourages students to report incidents to the public safety office so that a campus police officer may help with the process of filing criminal charges. A student may request that a friend, consultant, or other support person be present throughout the questioning.

If it is possible for the assailant to be apprehended, the suspect will be taken by police before the local magistrate and charged with the appropriate offenses at a preliminary arraignment. The student filing charges does not need to be present. The alleged perpetrator may be jailed or released on bail, depending on a number of considerations, including the nature of the incident, its severity, and the likelihood of the alleged perpetrator leaving the jurisdiction. The suspect will be told not to contact the student making the complaint. If the suspect does try to make contact with the student, the student is urged to call the police immediately.

A staff lawyer from the local district attorney's office will represent students filing charges without cost throughout the criminal proceedings. Students may also wish to seek legal advice from personal or family attorneys.

**Medical Services.** After a sexual assault, it is important that the victim receive a medical exam: 1) to treat his or her

injuries, 2) to assess the risk of sexually transmitted diseases or pregnancy, and 3) to gather physical evidence to be used if he or she wishes to press charges.

The student may go directly to the emergency room at Easton Hospital. The hospital will notify a counselor from the Crime Victims' Council of the Lehigh Valley, who will stay with the student throughout the examination to explain the various aspects of the exam and provide support. The hospital will also inform the public safety office and the Easton Police Department about the incident.

Students may also seek medical assistance from the Bailey Health Center. If the College Physician is available, he or she will discuss with the student whether he or she prefers to have an examination done at the Health Center or at Easton Hospital. The student is welcome to have a nurse or a support person with him or her during the exam.

**IMPORTANT:** Even though a victim's first impulse may be to shower or to change clothes, it is imperative that he or she retain as much physical evidence as possible. A victim should not wash, use the toilet, or change clothes. If clothes are changed, they should be placed in a paper bag and taken along to the examination. Even if a student feels certain that he or she will not wish to bring charges, it is important to gather as much physical evidence as possible should he or she change his or her mind about prosecuting at a later date.

**Counseling Services.** Victims of sexual assault who are able to talk about what happened to them have been found to recover more quickly. The College's Counseling Center provides confidential counseling for victims of sexual harassment and sexual assault. Psychologists can help victims to understand their emotional responses and to develop coping strategies. The Counseling Center, located on the second floor of the Bailey Health Center, is open from 8:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Students may make an appointment in person or by calling (610) 330-5005.

The Crime Victims Council of the Lehigh Valley is available 24 hours a day to help victims of sexual assault. The council can be reached through its phone hotline, (610) 437-6611. Counselors from CVC can accompany victims to the hospital, explain reporting and prosecution procedures, and provide individual and group counseling.

Students who wish to change their academic and/or living arrangements as a result of being a victim of an alleged sexual offense may receive assistance from the Office of the Dean of the College and Office of Residence Life. Changes will be facilitated if reasonably available.

## **Buildings and Grounds**

The Director of Plant Operations, the Director of Public Safety, and members of Lafayette College Student Government conduct periodic reviews of campus facilities and grounds, giving emphasis to providing adequate lighting and eliminating landscaping hazards. Public Safety personnel also report non-working exterior lights and potential hazards observed during their daily campus patrols.

Most residence halls are equipped with a burglar-alarm system designed to protect student property during vacations. Closed-circuit television cameras monitor Sullivan parking deck, lower Sullivan parking lot, March Field parking lot,

Watson Courts parking lot, Markle parking deck, and Snyder Street parking lots (east and west of North Third St.).

All academic, administrative, and athletic buildings are locked in the evenings and on weekends according to the scheduled use of the facilities. Access to these facilities is limited to students, faculty, staff, their guests, and visitors conducting official College business. Administrators, faculty, and staff are issued keys to their respective buildings. All campus residence halls and some academic and athletic buildings are on an electronic access control system. To gain access to these buildings, students, faculty, and staff members use electronic access tags rather than keys.

All residence halls are normally locked 24 hours a day. Students and residence hall personnel are issued electronic access tags to their respective buildings, and students are given one room key per occupant. Public safety office personnel check all buildings and patrol the grounds during their rounds. Public safety personnel provide escorts for students who request the service and check exterior residence hall doors.

Public Safety personnel who patrol buildings use a hand-held device to scan computer barcode tags on the buildings they patrol. The device stores the time that they checked the location. Personnel patrolling the grounds complete reports concerning their activities.

### **Student Residence Halls**

Lafayette students are housed in 22 residence halls, 5 private and College-owned fraternity houses, and 6 College-owned sorority houses. Most residence halls are coed, but single-sex units are available. Campus housing includes single rooms, doubles, triples, suites, and an apartment-style complex. Married students and students with children live off campus.

First-year students are required to live in residence halls unless they are commuting from their parents' home within a 40-mile radius of the College. Most of the College's residence halls include spaces for first-year students. First-year students provide housing preference information during the summer before they matriculate. The order in which housing assignments are made for first-year students is based on the date enrollment deposits are received at the College.

Upper-level students who do not commute from home are required to live on campus unless they receive written permission from the Director of Residence Life. Permission to reside off campus is not guaranteed. Upper-level students select their residence-hall rooms during the annual room-selection lottery. Seniors are given highest priority in room selection among the upper-level classes. During the room-selection process, available residence hall space may be committed before all students have selected. These students are then placed on a summer housing waiting list in lottery number order. College housing for all students on the waiting list is guaranteed.

Once the academic year has begun, the Office of Residence Life room-change policy allows students to move on a space-available, first-come-first-served basis. However, a two-week freeze on room changes is in effect at the beginning of each semester to verify occupancy records.

As stated previously, public safety personnel patrol all College buildings. All residence halls are equipped with security screens on first-floor windows and accessible windows on upper floors. All first-floor rooms are equipped with limiters that prevent windows from being opened wide enough for someone to enter.

Students may invite guests to stay overnight or over a weekend without obtaining special permission, but they are required to consult with their roommate(s) before doing so. Guests who are not siblings of their host must be at least 16 years old. All guests who are not Lafayette students are the responsibility of their host.

College housing is limited during the break between semesters. During fall break, Thanksgiving, and spring break, campus residence halls remain open. However there is minimum residential staffing during these breaks. During the January interim session, students enrolled in classes or conducting research are housed in a limited number of residence halls that remain open for that purpose. All College residence halls remain locked 24 hours a day during vacation periods as well as during the school year. Only College personnel and students with electronic access tags to the respective buildings may gain entrance.

These policies are outlined in the *Student Handbook* and the housing contract received by all residence hall students annually.

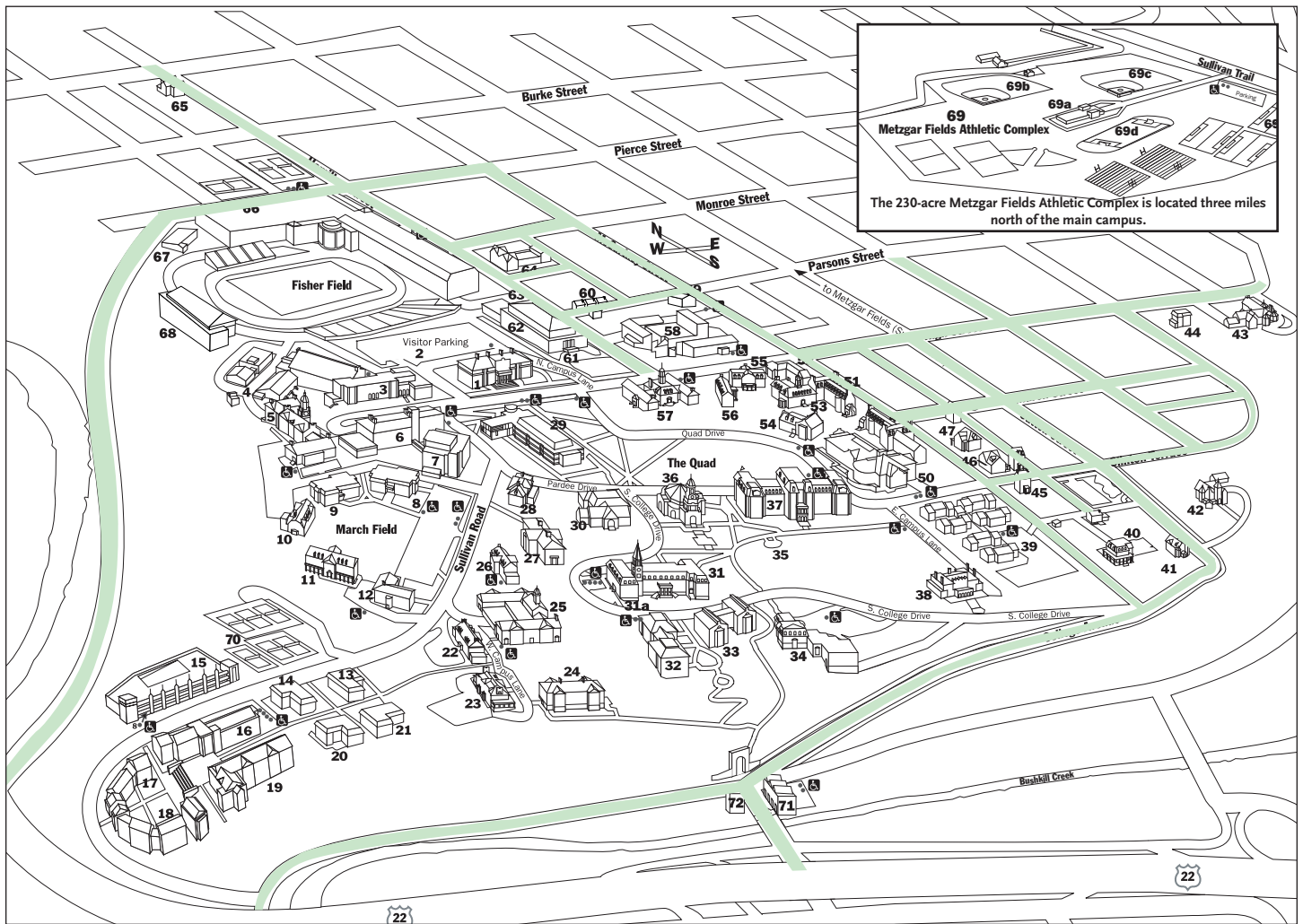

# Annual Fire Safety Report

Lafayette College is serviced by the City of Easton's full-time, paid, professional fire department. Members of the College community should immediately notify the public safety office at (610) 330-4444 if a fire occurs in a campus building or on campus grounds. The public safety office immediately will initiate a response by the Easton Fire Department using its communication link with the Northampton County Dispatch/Communications Center. All members of the public safety office have direct radio communication with the responding firefighters and may update the responding firefighters regarding the cause of fire alarm and status. A member of the College community who finds evidence of a fire that has been extinguished and does not know whether the public safety office has already responded, should notify the public safety immediately.

Fire alarms in campus facilities are designed to alert the College community to potential hazards, and members are required to heed their warning and evacuate buildings immediately upon hearing a fire alarm in a facility. Use the nearest stairwell and/or exit to leave the building immediately. Community members should familiarize themselves with the exits in each building. The College and/or the City of Easton's Fire Marshall may levy fines and penalties on individuals who fail to evacuate a building promptly when an alarm sounds – but safety is a more important reason for evacuating immediately.

When a fire alarm is activated in any building, all passenger elevators in all buildings will automatically discharge on the main floor. Occupants should use the stairs to evacuate the building. If you are caught in the elevator, push the emergency phone button. The emergency phones in elevators on campus ring to the dispatcher in the public safety office.

The public safety office publishes this fire safety report as part of its annual Clery Act Compliance document, via this brochure, which contains information with respect to the fire safety practices and standards for the College. This report includes statistics concerning the number of fires, the cause of each fire, the number of injuries and deaths related to fires, and the value of the property damage caused by a fire. The compliance document is available for review 24 hours a day on the public safety web site at [publicsafety.lafayette.edu/about-2](http://publicsafety.lafayette.edu/about-2).

In conjunction with the Easton Fire Department, Easton Bureau of Codes and Inspections, and Easton Health Bureau, the public safety office inspects all fraternity houses at least three times per year. The public safety office conducts fire-preplanning tours for the Easton Fire Department as well as fire drills in each residence hall, fraternity house, and sorority house twice each year and in selected academic buildings periodically. In addition, the Assistant Director of Public Safety for Environmental Health and Safety conducts safety inspections of selected buildings.

## Fire Protection Equipment/Systems

All College buildings, with the exception of detached garages, are equipped with automatic fire-detection and alarm systems. Refer to the Fire Safety Amenities in the Public Safety Residential Facilities Chart in this report for details information about fire detection, notification, and suppression systems in each residential facility.

## Emergency Evacuation Procedures

An evacuation drill is coordinated by the public safety office with the City of Easton Fire/Rescue each semester for all residential facilities on campus.

## Fire Safety Policies

Fire equipment is to be used only as necessary in case of fire: its use or misuse must be reported to Office of Residence Life immediately so that the equipment may be restored to useful condition without delay. Anyone identified as responsible for tampering with or theft of any College-owned fire extinguisher or other fire apparatus in any College-owned residence will be subject to an automatic \$300.00 fine and severe disciplinary action. If a person or persons responsible for tampering with fire equipment are not apprehended within a five-day period, the students living on the floor, wing, or section of the residence hall will be billed the \$300.00 on a per capita basis.

Decorations or furniture must never hinder exit from a room. Students are expected to leave the building for all fire alarms and drills. Lack of cooperation during fire drills or alarms will be considered a severe breach of discipline. Violators will be disciplined. Students must not decorate their room with combustible materials (paneling, combustible fabrics, etc.). Fiberglass or other fire-resistant hangings are acceptable if hung from picture molding. No items may be affixed to, installed in, or suspended from the ceiling in any student room. Fabric decorations may only cover a maximum of 50 percent of any wall in any student room. Posters may only cover a maximum of 50 percent of the wall space in any student room.

Firecrackers, gunpowder, and chemicals are strictly prohibited and, if found, will be confiscated and the owner subject to disciplinary action. Possession of burning or previously burned candles, incense, or kerosene lamps for any purpose is prohibited. Lamps may not use a halogen bulb. No appliances containing open heating elements may be used in student rooms. Hot plates, heaters, toaster ovens, etc., pose distinct fire hazards and overload electrical circuits. Microwave ovens (other than units available through the College designated rental program) are not permitted in student rooms.

All residence halls are equipped with an automatic fire detection system that notifies the public safety office immediately of the alarm. Fire alarm boxes and fire extinguishers are in all College buildings. Emergency exits are clearly marked.

## Fire Safety Education

All resident advisers are trained in fire-safety procedures and policies each year. The public safety office provides videos and other educational materials relating to fire safety for use in residence halls. During residence hall fire exit drills, participants are reminded of the importance of fire prevention and exiting the facility in a timely manner.

New employees are trained in fire-safety procedures during New-Hire Orientation.

## Fire Safety Tips

Buildings are equipped with a variety of features that are designed to detect, stop, and/or suppress the spread of a fire.

- A door can be the first line of defense against the spread of smoke or fire from one area to another. Some doors, such as fire doors in corridors or stairwells of residence halls, are designed to stand up to fire longer than the doors of individual rooms. It is important that these fire doors are closed for them to work effectively. If a fire door is equipped with a device to automatically close it in case of fire, it should not be propped open.
- When they operate properly, sprinklers are very effective in preventing the spread of fire. Do not prevent sprinklers from operating properly by obstructing sprinkler heads with materials like clothing hanging from the piping.
- Smoke detectors cannot do their job if they are disabled or covered. It is violation of College policy to disable or cover a smoke detector.
- Smoking is not permitted in any College building.
- A daily fire log is available for review 24 hours a day at the public safety office, 11 Marquis Hall. The information typically includes information about fires that occur in residential facilities, including the nature, date, time, and general location.

- Cooking of meals is not permitted in student rooms. This is a fire hazard and a health hazard. There are appropriate cooking areas in all student residential facilities.

## Fire Response Procedure

### In case of fire only:

1. Activate the nearest fire-alarm box. All alarm boxes are connected directly with the Office of Public Safety.
2. Call the Office of Public Safety at x4444, giving the exact location and nature of the fire. Evacuate the building using the procedure below.

### When you hear a fire alarm sound:

1. Close the windows but do not lock them.
2. Use a towel, handkerchief, or other cloth to cover your face in case there is heavy smoke. Stay close to the floor, moving on your hands and knees.
3. Feel the door. If it is warm, remain in the room. Seal the door with wet towels and call for help—ext. 4444 or 9 (for outside line) then 911.
4. If the door is cool, leave room but do not lock it.
5. DO NOT RUN. Proceed to nearest stairway fire-exit (not the elevator).
6. Exit the building immediately and stand well clear of the area. Gather in the spot designated for your residence hall or individual floor.
7. DO NOT re-enter the building until you have been given permission.
8. Faculty and resident advisers should assist in an orderly evacuation. Afterward, they should report all persons who violate fire safety procedures. Treat every fire drill as you would an actual fire. Everyone is expected to cooperate. Thank you.
